he Chicago Lighthouse marked another milestone on Saturday, July 26th, by building and dedicating a new state-of-the-art playground in one day.

The innovative facility, especially designed for youngsters with disabilities, was developed in partnership with KaBOOM!, a national non-profit dedicated to bringing balanced and active play into the lives of all children, and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, who helped fund the project.

Helping to make this exciting venture a reality were more than 200 volunteers from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, KaBOOM!, The Lighthouse, local Lions Clubs and many others. Assisting in the ribbon cutting was Chicago Alderman Robert Fioretti, who represents The Lighthouse in the City Council.

A key ingredient of the new handicapped-accessible playground is that children enrolled in The Lighthouse's educational programs had input on the shape and design of swings, slides and other features.

The agency staged a "Design Day" last June in which the youngsters drew items they wanted to include in their "dream playground."

Lighthouse President Dr. Janet Szlyk thanked KaBOOM!, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, the Lions and all the volunteers for their efforts in making the new facility a reality.



CHICAGO LIGHTHOUSE'S IN BRAILLE CARDS OFFER NEW DESIGNS, MESSAGES

Just in time for the upcoming holidays, The Chicago Lighthouse's inBrailleTM Greeting Cards have been expanded with new designs and messages.

First unveiled this past winter to celebrate Valentine's Day, the cards were specially designed for the 108-year-old agency by local artist Alisa Singer. The greeting card line now extends to an all-ocassion pack, a Tikkun Olam series as well as holiday cards.

Packaged by participants in The Lighthouse's Adult programs, they celebrate the unique beauty and compelling nature of Braille as both a language and art form.


The pattern of the contemporary art design on the cover of each card corresponds to the embossed Braille message included inside the card.

"While 100% of the card sales will support The Lighthouse's services to people who are blind or visually impaired, they are intended to be read and enjoyed by

everyone," Ms. Singer noted.

She added that what sets these cards apart from those issued by other blind service organizations is that they showcase Braille and its aesthetic appeal, making them both unique and more closely aligned with The Lighthouse's mission of providing hope and support for individuals who are blind or visually impaired.

He is a special assistant corporate counsel for the City of Chicago's Law Department/Labor Division serving on a pro bono basis.


Mr. Schnadig says that he was drawn to Board service because of personal empathy with The Lighthouse's mission as a result of his own and his wife's eye problems.
